In November, the Workplace Safety and Insurance Board's (WSIB) Board of Directors approved the Rate

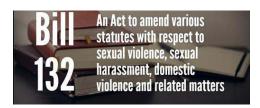
Framework. This approval will allow the WSIB to move forward with the important work of implementation, including significant system modifications necessary for a 2019 implementation.

The WSIB is committed to ensuring the Rate Framework is implemented in a manner that fosters stability. Beginning in 2017, the WSIB will undertake further education and outreach efforts, including further discussion on the promotion of occupational health and safety, to ensure a broader understanding of the new approach.

## Health-care Providers Face Challenges in Returning Workers With Complex Injuries: Study

Most health-care providers don't have problems with the workers' compensation system or the return-to-work (RTW) process when they treat patients with visible, acute physical injuries supported by clear medical evidence. However, when they are treating patients with more complex injuries and illnesses, such as chronic pain, mental health issues, gradual-onset conditions and multiple injuries, the going is not always as smooth. This was the finding of an Institute for Work & Health (IWH) study that explored the role of health-care providers in

RTW and the challenges they face. The researchers found that, when dealing with complex claims, the interactions between health-care providers and the workers' compensation system could be marked by role confusion, misaligned perspectives about the timing of return to work, poor communications and more. # Fatigue Awareness Classroom Training

Fatigue has the ability to affect a person both mentally and physically. Fatigue increases the chances of making errors at work, therefore making it a workplace health and safety risk.



Applicable to any sector, this awareness course aims to provide a better understanding of fatigue and the importance of sleep. Those who take the course will gain a comprehensive perspective on the risks associated with fatigue and the intervention and prevention strategies that can be implemented.

The course is \$150.00 pp for onsite or regional sessions, and runs for 1.5 hours.

# Health and Safety Representative eLearning

As per the Occupational Health and Safety Act, Ontario workplaces with 6-19 employees regularly employed and no Joint Health and Safety Committee (JHSC) are required to have a health and safety representative.

The main purpose of a health and safety representative is to improve workplace health and safety. Primarily, a health and safety representative identifies workplace hazards and makes recommendations for improvement

PSHSA's Health and Safety Representative training program

covers the fundamentals of workplace health and safety including responsibilities and duties, legal requirements under the Occupational Health and Safety Act, hazard recognition and control, workplace inspection and investigation techniques and prevention resources. This eLearning course will cover the essentials of the role, including how to:

- Identify and control hazards,
- Resolve health and safety complaints and issues,
- Participate in investigations of work refusals,
- Develop, implement and monitor programs,
- Inspect the workplace on a regular basis, and to
- Investigate incidents and accidents such as critical injuries and fatalities

Health and Safety Representative eLearning training will take approximately 3 hours to complete, and will be available on our website on February 1.
